SWRC (Solid Waste & Recycling Committee) News

The SWRC has been meeting quarterly on a regular basis. Our meetings are the first Wednesday of the month in February, May, August, and November. We alternate meeting sites between the Wayne and Readfield Town Offices. We consist of two residents each from Readfield and Wayne, along with one Select Board member from each town, the Assistant Transfer Station Manager and the Transfer Station Manager. At our November meeting we were able to meet with our new manager, Eric Dyer. Eric brings a wealth of knowledge about waste and it's management to our committee.

We have been working on getting a cover for the demolition bin to keep rain and snow out, and it has finally been approved, ordered, arrived and is partially installed. We have also worked on getting new signs for the area to help folks know where to place materials and which ones require a fee to be paid. Several of the signs have been placed and we now await the ground to thaw to place the remaining ones. They are all reflective so they can be seen at night. Materials with red signs have a fee required and those with green signs do not have a fee.

An updated fee schedule should be available by this Spring; be sure to ask for one so you can come prepared for any fees. You may also have noticed that much of the inner road at the station was repaved this year. Look for new stripping this Spring too.

We continue to evaluate the costs and expenses of the entire station and have been able to hold the total cost steady for four years. We are working on ways to increase awareness of recycling and encourage everyone to recycle everything they can.

Cabin Fever Reliever: Your Readfield Trails are a blast in the winter, too!

Yes, your town trails are available for *year round* enjoyment. It really does not matter what the weatherman may be saying. Snowing out? This can be the best time for snowshoeing, cross country skiing or just plain walking... Especially if beauty and peace are what you're after. Firm snow? Sometimes all you need are light boots for your workout. Icy? Bring along your Yak Tracks or Stabilicers for go-anywhere confidence. Muddy? That's a great time to try the Fairgrounds and Community Pathway trails. They are surfaced with all-weather blue stone for go-anytime durability. Windy and bitter cold? There are plenty of sheltered woods trails where all you have to do is keep moving to stay warm. Runner or dog walker? See all of the above. Need a place to park? The Fairgrounds has plowed parking just off Church Road. Plan your route with the aid of the maps located in the kiosks at the Fairgrounds trailhead and just up the trail from the Route 17 "Trail" sign. And don't overlook the Torsey Pond Nature Preserve (off Route 41) and the Fogg Farm Conservation Area (off Fogg Road) for spectacular stream and lake views... Bring your camera! The "Readfield Village Trail Map" and the "Outdoor Recreation & Conservation Areas Map", although in high demand, are usually available at the Town Office. Also, check out Readfield Trails on Facebook and www.mainetrailfinder.com. Enjoy your trails this winter!

CDL Class B: Dump Truck or Bus

This class prepares you to meet Maine DMV requirements and gives you the hands-on skills that employers demand. The course consists of 42 hours of classroom instruction to prepare you for the CDL license process, including written and skills exam. The 30 hours of one-on-one range instruction will prepare you for the road test. In addition to the cost of the course, a \$35 permit fee, payable to the Secretary of State, is due by the 2nd class. Additional endorsements of Bus, Tank and Hazmat are \$10 each.

For the bus driving endorsement, you must be over 21, have a clean driving record, and get a physical exam at your own expense.

Readfield Historical Society Notes by Flo Drake



OK, so winter finally arrived, and we can get on with our usual schedules: making sure we have shovels and salt within reach rather than way out in the garden shed, putting a few gallons of water in the basement in case the power goes off, bringing in wood before having to chip it out of a frozen stack, and listening too much to the newscasters who hype each storm and stir up the people so they clean out the milk and bread aisles even for a 2" snowfall. Such is winter in Maine.

BUT, winter also means the Annual Meeting of the Readfield Historical Society, this year on Saturday, Feb. 6th. As always, it will be held upstairs in the Town Office with the Business Meeting beginning at 1:00PM. Members have quite a lot of business to take care of this year, so please be on time. Reward for suffering through the meeting will be yummy homemade goodies. Cookie bakers have been mobilized, so get your tummies ready.

At 2:00PM, the general public is invited to join members to hear our speakers, this year Steven Garrett, a docent at the Joshua Chamberlain Museum in Brunswick. Mr. Garrett has had a keen interest in Civil War history all his life, is also a volunteer for the Pejepscot Historical Society, a member of the Joshua Chamberlain Civil War Roundtable, and a participant in a Civil War book club. His presentation will be on Dr. Abner O. Shaw, who was born on Kents Hill and who requested to be assigned to the 20th Maine Regiment during the Civil War. He managed to save General Joshua Chamberlain's life at Petersburg, Virginia and became Chamberlain's personal physician for the rest of JC's life, signing his death certificate at the end. Dr. Shaw continued to practice medicine in Portland until old age.

Do come and hear about one of Kents Hill's remarkable people. Mr. Garrett is enthusiastic about his subject and proves to be an interesting speaker.

Budget Committee News by: Kathryn Mills Woodsum, Chair

The Budget Committee began our work on the 2016-17 budget in November of 2015. We met with our new Town Manager, Eric Dyer, to become familiar with the process that has been used in the past and what he and we had for suggestions to improve the process. A good discussion ensued and Eric brought forth a plan to the Select Board that was approved at their December meeting. The plan is available on the town website with all meeting dates and times noted.

We met with the Select Board in December to review the CIP, our Capital Investment/Improvement Plan, which is essentially a very planned and thorough long-range budget for projects that exceed \$10,000. We found that about half of the items listed were either completed, moved to an indefinite time in the future, or were rejected. Eric will revise the plan creating additional sheets showing these categories. The rest of the items were discussed and agreed upon in general. This plan will be revisited this budget season.

Our work with the proposed budget began in January and comprises three meetings with the Town Manager, Finance Officer, and the chairs of all committees, commissions and boards. We hear the requests, ask questions about what is necessary, what the scope of any projects are, and the comparison to previous years. After we have gathered all of this information we will meet again in February to discuss what appears to be viable for the town to afford. This will be our first budget draft. There will not be income figures available at that time so nothing will be certain at that point.

The Select Board will be reviewing the budget progress we make each meeting and developing their budget recommendations. The town will hold a public information meeting in March where citizens can continue to provide input with the entire draft budget ready to discuss. Both the Select Board and Budget Committee will each meet to consider the input from the public, along with projected income figures and then create their final budgets.

Mount Vernon Food Bank

People in Readfield who find they are in need at any time during the year do not have to go hungry. The Mt. Vernon Food Bank, located at the First Baptist Church in Mt. Vernon, serves the people of Readfield in addition to Vienna, Fayette and Mt. Vernon.
